Since 2003 she has been employed at the Institute of the Republic of Slovenia for Nature Conservation, where she first carried out tasks of the Scientific authority CITES for Slovenia. Since 2010, she has been managing various projects in the field of nature conservation, among others the awarded wining project "Conservation and Management of Freshwater Wetlands in Slovenia – WETMAN. Currently, she is the manager of the project: Conservation and management of dry grasslands in Eastern Slovenia - LIFE TO GRASSLANDS.</p>
